## **College process of electing SRC**



#### 1. Why we elect the SRC

The SRC is elected in line Section 4 of the CET Act 16 of 2006 as amended. The SRC forms part of the governance structures of the College. The act provides the constitution of amongst others. The college consists of  $\neg$ 

- (a) the council.
- (b) the academic board.
- (c) the staff.

#### (d) te SRC;

(e) the students of the college; and

(g) such other offices, bodies or structures as may be established by the council.

2. When is the SRC elected

The SRC is elected in the with the SRC elections policy. The elections policy makes provision for the SRC to be elected in February. The SRC Term of office commences on 01 March of each year and ends in February the following year.

#### 3.Who qualifies

A student should meet the minimum requirements in line with the eligibility criteria set out by the College, endorsed by the academic board and approved by the College Council. A student should have progressed with a 60% average and must have passed 7/7 for NCV and 4/4 for report 191 for both engineering and business studies.

#### 4. What is involved

The College identifies a service provider to run the SRC elections and Campuses are expected to form elections committee to ensure that Campuses challenges are solved and ventilated.

Students nominate candidates and the elections committee assist in vetting of the students in line with the college eligibility criteria in order to ensure that they meet the minimum requirements

5. Where are the elections taking place?

The College took a decision that all SRC elections would be held online. The College provides data for all registered students to service provider for the purpose of the elections. Elections are held in one day across all delivery sites.

#### 6. How is the process

After all nominations and vetting process has closed, the elections committee will invite all candidates to verify the ballot paper in line with the elections timetable. A manifesto day will be held where all candidates present their manifestos in front of students.

On voting day all students will make use of their smartphones to cast their votes. Students without smartphones will be provided with a desktop where they can privately cast their votes.

The voting system will provide stats on all votes cast for all sites. The System calculates automatically, and results are issued the following day.

#### **Training of SRC Members**

Training on roles and responsibilities is provided for the elected leadership and an inauguration ceremony is held where an oath of the office is taken .

There's a provision of an attire and communication devices for the term of office.

### THE NEED OF FRAUD AND ETHICS AWARENESS

Several members of Tshwane North TVET College participated in a campaign on risk, fraud, and ethics that was held at the Simens Hall Mamelodi campus on Wednesday, February 26, 2025, by the Risk, Fraud, and Integrity Management team in collaboration with Student Support Services. Encouraging staff and students to be whistleblowers and take part in the fight against potential fraud and corruption within the College was the primary goal, along with educating them about the risks of fraud and ethics.



Respected speaker from the Student Support Services Mr Ngubane delivered insights into the support provision in the college for students which encompasses a range of services aimed at assisting students academically, personally, financially, including academic advising, tutoring, counselling, career guidance, health services, financial aid, disability support and access to learning resources. Mr. Ngubane further put emphasis on fraud prevention and anti-corruption to the TNC community – emphasizing the need for ethical behavior. Students engaging in sexual relations with lecturers in exchange for free grades, vandalism, and fabricating attendance are a few examples of these unethical practices.

There was a demonstration by Miss Charity Monyoko. Attendance registers and flyers were distributed throughout the presentation on risk, fraud, and integrity management. These posters include details and the email address or hotline number for reporting instances of fraud and corruption. Businesses and organizations are the ones most impacted by fraud, according to Miss Monyoko, and these fraudulent operations are carried out by employees, students, or outside parties. The exchange of personal information, whether online, offline, or in person, can lead to fraudulent acts.

A person who reveals any facts or actions that are thought to be unlawful, immoral, or corrupt within an organization is known as a whistle-blower.
